Dr. Tarpy Awarded EAS Research Award

Dr. David Tarpy was presented the prestigious James I. Hambleton Memorial Award for Outstanding Research in August during the annual Conference of the Eastern Apicultural Society in Boone, NC.

Dr. Tarpy wears two hats in our North Carolina apiculture program. He is an Associate Professor of Entomology at North Carolina State University, and also serves as Extension Apiculturist for state beekeepers.

Since arriving in North Carolina just seven years ago, Dr. Tarpy has made a big influence on the honeybee program in NC. During his first year, he applied for and was awarded a grant from the Golden Leaf program that funded a cost sharing program in which 250 beginning beekeepers were awarded two hives with bees. That program received national recognition and resulted in the doubling of membership doubling in our NC State Beekeepers Association which now totals nearly 2,500 members and is the largest of its kind in the nation.

Dr. Tarpy administers the state's Master Beekeeping Program which now includes some 3,000 active participants.

His recent research, which has also received national acclaim, focuses on the biology and behavior of honey bee queens, including field manipulations, behavioral observation, instrumental insemination and molecular genetics. As a direct result of that research, we know that healthier hives result from queens which mate with a larger number of drones—a fact that produces greater diversity in the colony.

More recently, his lab group examined the viability of commercially produced queens, testing their genetic diversity and mating success in an attempt to improve queen quality.

In addition to these achievements, Dr. Tarpy teaches a full schedule at NCSU and is constantly available to NC beekeepers to advise and assist with the challenges we face.

Congratulations, Dr. Tarpy. We're very fortunate that you're our Apiculturist!

Wake County Sheriff Encounters Bees

A Wake County sheriff's deputy found himself in the middle of a swarm of bees Tuesday, August 17th, when he went to check on a report of a disabled truck near the Smithfield Road exit off U.S. Highway 64.



The truck, pulling a trailer of honeybee hives being moved from Mount Airy to Rocky Mount, broke down before dawn, said Phyllis Stephens, a spokeswoman for the sheriff's office. When the sun rose and the bees became active, they began to fly around.

The deputy took shelter in his car, which was quickly covered with the bees.



The sheriff's office called for help from a local beekeeper and the apiculture department at North Carolina State University. The experts coaxed many of the bees back into boxes for transport. Those that remained on the deputy's car were scattered as he drove away, Stephens said.

September in the Bee Yard



Be sure to treat your hives for varroa mites if you have not done so already.

The asters should start blooming on or about September 21st and should continue blooming through most of October. They continue to bloom even after a light frost. This honey is usually all stored in the brood chamber.

Heft your hives and make sure the bees have enough honey to eat through the winter. If the hives feel light and are in need of food, make sure you feed your sugar water bees.

Also check that the queen and colony is in good health as the fall season approaches.
